PAST APPOINTMENTS

August 1976 to January 1977, House Physician, Burton General Hospital, Burton on Trent, Staffordshire. A busy district general hospital covering all aspects of acute general medicine.

February 1977 to July 1977, House Surgeon, Burton General Hospital, Burton on Trent, Staffordshire. A busy district general hospital admitting both acute and cold general surgical patients. Considerable, supervised operating experience for the interested house surgeon.

December 1977 to December 1979, General Duties Medical Officer, Garrison Medical Centre, Hameln, West Germany. A two doctor general practice covering a large garrison population.

January 1980 to December 1980, Senior House Officer in General Surgery, Duchess of Kent Military Hospital, Catterick, Yorkshire. A wide range of acute and cold general surgery with particular emphasis on trauma and orthopaedics. Considerable, supervised operating experience. Both military and civilian patients treated.

January 1981 to June 1981, Casualty Senior House Officer, Cambridge Military Hospital, Aldershot. This unit serves a large garrison town and local civilian population making the job varied and very busy.

July 1981 to December 1981, Orthopaedic Senior House Officer, Queen Elizabeth Military Hospital, Woolwich. The Consultant Adviser's unit in which a broad range of mainly booked orthopaedic surgery is carried out on both military and civilian patients. Good supervised operating experience for the trainee.

February 1982 to June 1982, Senior House Officer in General Surgery, Queen Elizabeth Military Hospital, Woolwich. The Army oncology unit in addition to which acute and booked general surgical experience is available. The Professor of Military Surgery has beds on the unit. Military and civilian patients are treated.

July 1982 to December 1982, Senior House Officer in Burns and Plastic Surgery, Queen Elizabeth Military Hospital, Woolwich. The Consultant Adviser's unit which included a bi-service Burns Unit taking both military and civilian acute burns. The Falkland Campaign finished during this period producing a considerable burn and reconstructive workload.

May 1983 to September 1985, Registrar / Senior Registrar, British Military Hospital, Münster, West Germany. A wide range of acute and cold general surgery combined with much trauma and orthopaedics make this a true 'military' surgical post.

October 1985 to September 1986, Honorary Registrar in Plastic Surgery, Addenbrookes Hospital, Cambridge. A small plastic surgery unit with a wide range of operating experience available in an academic setting.

October 1986 to September 1988, Honorary Senior Registrar in Plastic Surgery, West Norwich Hospital, Norwich. A large regional plastic surgery and burns unit. Considerable experience in paediatric burns and congenital abnormalities available.

October 1988 to October 1989, Senior Registrar in Burns and Plastic Surgery, Queen Elizabeth Military Hospital, Woolwich. The Army burns unit taking both civilian and

military burns with an increasing workload of trauma reconstruction being undertaken.

March 1989 to September 1989, Honorary Senior Registrar in Plastic Surgery, Queen Victoria Hospital, East Grinstead. Attendance at this internationally renowned unit has been for two days a week including one night on call.

October 1989 appointed Consultant in Burns and Plastic Surgery at Queen Elizabeth Military Hospital, Woolwich, the only military plastic surgery unit of the Defence Medical Services. An acute burns unit takes military casualties from around the world and civilian burns locally. Patient load is roughly half military and half civilian. Paediatric plastic surgery is performed abroad and in a local Health Service Hospital. This is a tertiary referral unit for reconstructive plastic surgery, particularly lower limb trauma. Out station clinics and operating sessions are held regularly in both the UK and abroad.

November 1992 Appointed Consultant Adviser in Burns and Plastic Surgery to the Director General Army Medical Services.

November 1993 Appointed Consultant Adviser in Plastic Surgery to the Royal Air Force.

June 1995 Retired from the Army to take up an NHS post.

September 2000 Appointed to Medical Advisory Committee of the Blackheath Hospital.

NHS APPOINTMENT

May 1995 appointed consultant plastic surgeon to Guy's and St Thomas' Hospital Trust. This is the largest Hospital Trust in the United Kingdom and a major London Teaching Hospital.

Autumn 1995 appointed Deputy Clinical Director ENT and Plastic Surgery

Autumn 1998 appointed Clinical Director Department of Plastic Surgery, Guy's and St Thomas' Hospital Trust.

November 1999 resigned from the National Health Service to work full time in the private sector.
